Creating Connection on the Border

Abara House | Relational Connection

Abara is in the early stages of a capital campaign to bring Abara House to life as a future Borderland Center for Peace and Transformation.



- * **Global Café & Marketplace** - Celebrating food, culture, and craftsmanship.
- * **Event & Training Spaces** - Hosting dialogues, leadership development, immersive learning, concerts, and a mix of public and private events.
- * **Contemplative Gardens & Chapel** - Spaces for reflection, lament, and healing.
- * **Guest Housing** - Welcoming visitors to engage firsthand in border realities.

Border Education | Experiential Learning

Three-day immersive experiences that deepen empathy and understanding through:

- * **Firsthand engagement with migration realities.**
- * **Conversations with migrants, shelter leaders, and law enforcement.**
- * **Space for reflection, storytelling, and action.**



Border Response | Meaningful Action

Working alongside 16 shelters in Juárez, Abara provides:



- * **Essential resources** - Meals, hygiene kits, and infrastructure support.
- * **Micro-enterprise training** - Economic opportunities for displaced families.
- * **Leadership care** - Respite and training for shelter directors and staff.



WHERE WE WORK

CD. JUÁREZ - EL PASO: SISTER CITIES

A Region of Movement & Connection

The Cd. Juárez - El Paso region is one of the most dynamic border crossings in the world. As the largest bilingual, binational community in the Western Hemisphere, it is home to **2.7M+** people connected by culture, commerce, and family ties.

Interwoven Lives & Economies

Over **80%** of El Paso population is Hispanic. **23.1%** of El Paso residents are foreign-born.

Juárez is a major manufacturing hub, driving binational trade.

Families and businesses flow daily across the border.

20M+ annual crossings.

A Global Migration Corridor

Although migrant crossings in El Paso were noticeably higher in previous years, there was a **significant decline** in 2025. Many neighbors on the move remain in Juárez, where Abara continues to accompany individuals, children, and families across a range of living situations.

A Place of History & Resilience

A **historic** crossroads for Indigenous trade, the Camino Real, Butterfield Trail and modern migration.

The border fence symbolizes both division and connection.

Despite challenges, the people here embody hospitality and strength.

- Provided **leadership retreats and getaways** for shelter directors/leaders to prevent burnout.

- Raised **\$1.8M** toward the capital campaign from 2021 through 2025.
- Advanced site development for a sustainable peace-building center.



ABARA HOUSE CAPITAL CAMPAIGN: A BORDERLAND CENTER FOR PEACE



Rooted in History, Shaping the Future

Located only feet from the U.S.-Mexico border, this historic site has long been a place of movement and exchange:

- Indigenous trade routes predated colonization.
- Spanish settlers arrived in 1598.
- The site witnessed revolutions and key moments in the U.S.-Mexico border.

Now, it is being restored as a space for peace and transformation.

A Vision for Sustainability

Abara House will be financially self-sustaining (after renovation) generating revenue through:

- **Hospitality & Events**
Supporting dozens of events and training.
- **Education & Training**
Facilitating border encounters and immersive learning experiences.
- **Micro-enterprise initiatives**
Empowering migrant communities and people around the world experiencing instability.



AN INVITATION TO INVEST

ABARA HOUSE CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

We are raising an estimated **\$20M** + to complete Abara House as a **self-sustaining hub** for learning, hospitality, and advocacy.

Your investment will:

- **Preserve Historic Landmark**
Restoring the Hacienda and its surrounding spaces.
- **Create a Sustainable Campus**
Green infrastructure, water conservation, and shaded spaces.
- **Expand Transformative Programming**
Supporting Border Encounters and Advocacy.

Asset Acquisitions in 2025:

- Abara invested \$228,978 in 2025 in property acquisition & loan payoffs.
- These investments directly increase Abara's stake in the Abara House campus and accelerate the path toward full ownership of the future Abara House site.

BORDER JOY | According to Rosa, Toya, and Ana

Rosa Mani Thomas, Juárez Team Coordinator

Hello friends, My name is Rosa Mani Thomas, and I arrived to these precious borderlands 9 years ago. At first, things were very difficult for me. I didn't have a great support system, but I decided to stay and live here. My decision came after that dark night in September when I was deported from the U.S.

This was a very sad time, full of uncertainty; however, God gave me the opportunity to pick myself up little by little, to walk in love, dignity, hope, strength, and A LOT of work. He also allowed me to flourish where he planted me, here in the middle of the desert.

Today, to be able to walk hand in hand with others who find themselves in the same situation that I did 9 years ago has given deep meaning to my life. Juárez gave me

a deep exhale in the middle of my desperation. I have learned to enjoy these borderlands, to breathe them in, feel them, love them, respect them, and above all to honor them.

I have learned that all of us here smell like resilience, a resilience that sooner or later becomes joy. For me, it is the joy of walking with others, the joy of being family through sadness, the joy of forgetting our loneliness, because now, now we are one! The joy of enjoying every morning God gives me, every precious orange sunset that only Juárez could give. I am Rosa Mani Thomas, and I live in victory here in the desert.

It seems odd to be thinking about joy in the midst of chaos, and by chaos I mean harsher treatment of immigrants in the U.S., cultivating fear in their everyday lives, and no clear hope of any immigration reform or policy coming soon for those whose goal is to get to the U.S.. Yet, when I think about the border, the joy and chaos can co-exist at the same time. How? Well, as someone that is a border girl or a 'fronteriza', as I like to call myself, I can see the joy in Ciudad Juarez, my home.

I can see the joy in all the migrants that are able to attend English classes and music classes in our office in Juarez.

I can see the joy in the migrant mothers who get to have a space to heal while their kids are being taken care of. I can see the joy in our team every time we listen to how these migrants are changing our way of seeing life. Thus, yes, both joy and chaos can coexist at the border.

Borders have always been surreal in that sense; resilient to survive in that sort of duality: joyous and chaotic. Borders nature is to embrace that duality and to allow them to create new ways of life.

Hello World! I would like to introduce myself. My name is Ana C. Born in Ciudad Juárez, Chihuahua. Raised in Oklahoma for 33 yrs. Been deported to Juárez for fifteen months now. I'm a single mother of seven beautiful children. And by the grace of God my mother has them back home in Oklahoma.

I am a widow of twenty six months now. I have overcome depression! Learned and am still learning about letting things go and why I seem to harbor grief. I am a daughter of God! I am blessed! Found myself more humble than ever. Even more I am very grateful for the good and bad.

Praying non-stop bc I know our Father in heaven listens and well just as it says in 2 Corinthians 5:7 "Walk By Faith Not By Sight!" A year ago I thought my life was over; but now, I am surrounded by amazing people from Abara most of all! They believed in me and THAT motivated me to want better in life and take advantage to have a second opportunity at life! With nothing but love; God first.

NEIGHBORS FROM THE OTHER SIDE | Friends across the border

Even if you don't know your neighbors, you are a witness to their lives and they to yours. You see each other's homes, passing cars. Until you know your neighbors, they are like background noise, like a green screen. For a long time, we would look through the mesh-like metal of the border fence behind Abara and we'd see a bright orange apartment. We'd squint past the barbed wire in the river and the tall cranes from the construction project burying the canal.

Everyone who works at Abara or visits Abara looks through the fence into Juárez hearing the sounds, sometimes even the smells! And we wondered if they could see us too, could see the new mural on the office facing south, could see us when we stood on the roof and dreamed about future binational events.

One day Sami crossed over the international bridge downtown, got in the car with Rosa, and they went to walk the blocks in Juárez adjacent to Abara's Campus. They met people walking to and from work, they knocked on doors, introducing themselves with a simple message: "We're your neighbors!", always pointing back toward the Hacienda, the apartments, the offices, and the new mural that's

visible from Juárez. They were met with some suspicion and some confusion. Roberto and Lupita lived in one of the orange apartments, and some extended family in other units. Their family has been there for over 50 years! Roberto and Lupita's family remembers when the view of El Paso and the river looked very different than it does today.

After a few more visits from Rosa, our vecinos del otro lado agreed to let us host a meal with them, on the sidewalk in front of their apartments. Our team along with friends from two nearby shelters

gathered for tacos de discada. A popsicle cart rolled by and we erupted in joy. Sometimes the best reason to get together is because you are proximate. You are witnesses to each other's lives. We dream that one day Abara Juárez will be instrumental in installing beautiful public spaces along the river bank across from Abara El Paso, and that we will host binational events based in art, music, sport, and international friendship. But for now, we'll just be having tacos again in a few weeks with Roberto and Lupita.

In 2025, Abara’s border response focused on meeting basic urgent needs, restoring dignity, and fostering human connection—in partnership with shelters and organizations including Tres Ríos, DHIA, MCC, and DIF.

El Paso Response

Abara played a key role in supporting immigrant advocacy and legal awareness in 2025, contributing to court observation efforts, participating in weekly community vigils, collaborating with regional advocacy groups, and connecting others to these efforts. Provided critical guidance and support to families navigating detention processes in El Paso, offering connections, information, and on-the-ground assistance.

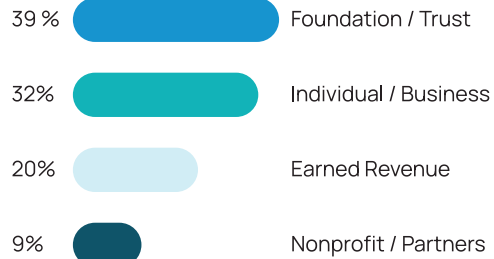
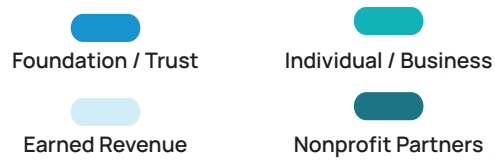
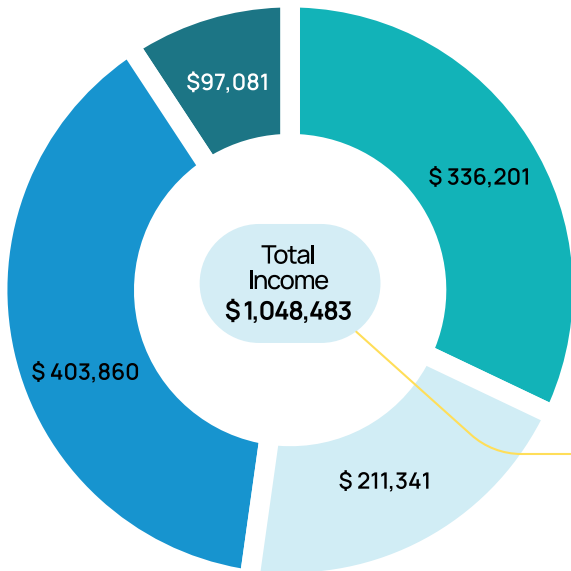
Abara co-facilitated:

- **67** Offsite events reached over **7,600** people around the US and the world.

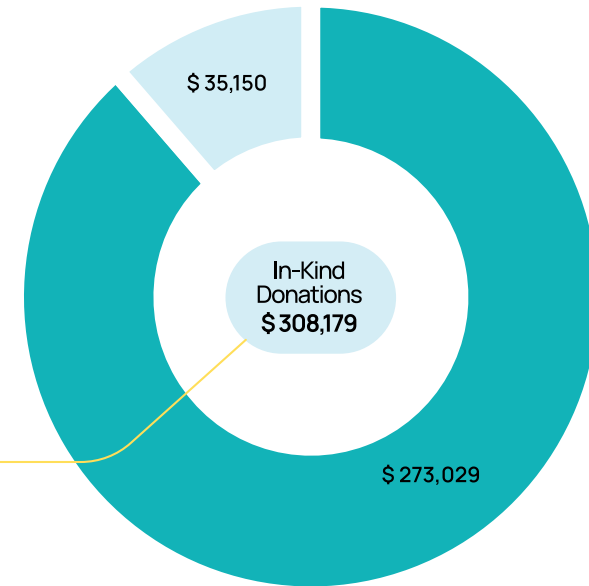


2025 FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

Additional In-Kind Donations



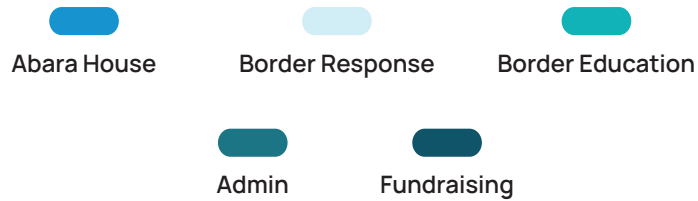
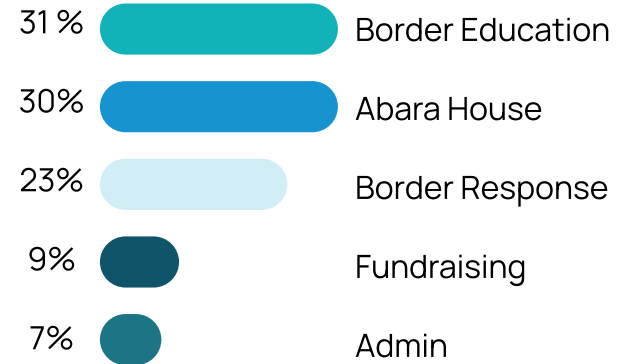
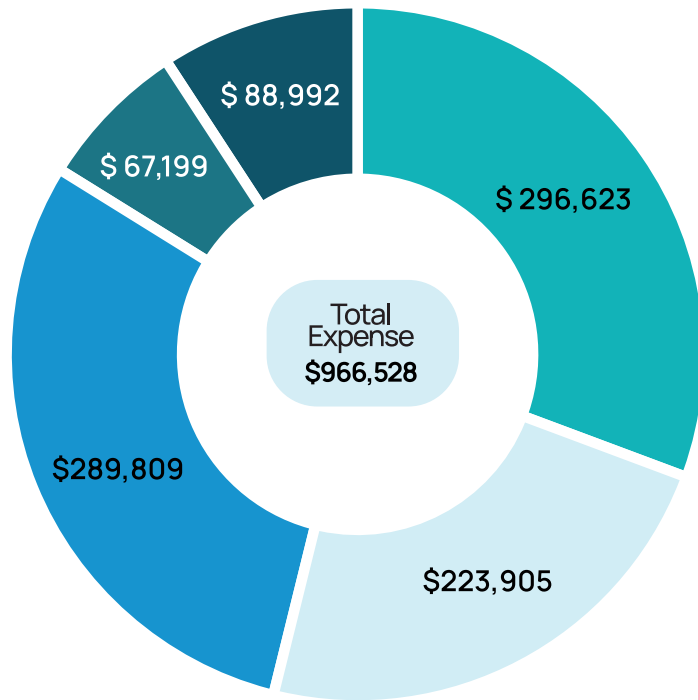
In addition to financial contributions, Abara received significant in-kind support:

- Asset-building contributions include both a \$225k reduction in the purchase price of the historic Ft. Bliss property and \$48,029 in assignment of loan interests in the Hacienda that increase Abara's ownership stake in the property.
- Additional in-kind support includes donated goods and professional services that directly supported program delivery.
